Churchwarden's Month: Two Graveyards & A Messy Church



Most people know Sir John Betjeman as having been our treasured "Poet Laureate", from 1972 until his death in 1984, writing poems like "Come friendly bombs and fall on Slough "; "A Shropshire Lad " and "In Westminster Abbey "

But in 1937, the Parishioners of a small village, then in Berkshire, knew something else- that Sir John was REALLY good at being Churchwarden of St Mary's Parish Church, Uffington.

His love for the Churchyard was, I like to think, only surpassed by his passion for the fictitious Miss Joan Hunter Dunn, the tennis-playing object of his desire in "A Subalterns Song "

On morning in March 1937, I think its quite likely that John, as he was then was strolling around the churchyard in his home village and thought to himself" That grass needs cutting!

So it was for me, too, this morning, as I looked at the Churchyard at Holy Trinity, Privett, and I realised that "I had better get started on that churchyard again this year "

I hope that our Poet / Churchwarden, back then, could call upon the support of a 1930's Christopher Brockhurst to help with the mowing, and a pre-war lan Hughes to pick up sticks, and build a bonfire, as I did today and I'm grateful for their help.

Here is a photo of Holy Trinity, Privett, churchyard, on 20 March, having been cut for the first time this year, with wild flowers lovingly preserved. If you would like to join me in working on Privett Churchyard, OR, on Froxfield High Cross churchyard, to create peaceful, respectful places like these churchyards can be, please contact me to join our small team of volunteers

HISTORY does not record whether Sir John ever attended a "Messy Church" Service back then in the 1930's, but if he didn't, he could have seen a perfect example of one, here in Froxfield Village Hall, on Saturday 9th March.

On Saturday 20 April the Privett Village Hall Trust holds its Annual General Meeting – followed by a Curry and Pudding Night. Here are the details of the evening:

The (pay) bar opens at 6.30pm. The AGM begins at 7.00pm and curry will be served as soon as the business of the AGM is concluded. The AGM includes receiving the Treasurer's Report & the Chairman's for the year ended 31 December 2023 and the election of the officers and committee members of the Trust for the coming year.

This year, by way of special business, there will be a resolution relating to the plans of the committee to change the constitution of the Trust by updating the provisions relating to the possible dissolution of the Trust (not that there are any plans to dissolve the Trust, far from it! – but grant-making bodies increasingly require charities such as the Trust to have dissolution provisions which accord with current best practice, so that those bodies can see that any grants they make will always be used for a charitable purpose). All are encouraged to attend, and Privett residents and others who have attended Privett Village Hall events are entitled to vote in any election.

The Village Hall is successful and vibrant, thanks to the hard work of an energetic committee. We welcome new committee members, and anyone who is interested in joining the committee should speak to the Chairman (Graham Flack: email: graham.flack@filmorehill.co.uk) for further information.Entry to the AGM is, of course, free. Those who stay for the Curry and Pudding Night are asked to reserve tickets in advance to ensure numbers are catered for – this is always a popular event and we want to be certain that there is plenty for all.

The Future of Our Hall



As you will have read in previous editions, Froxfield Village Hall doesn't have enough engaged volunteer Trustees to keep running the hall into the future. The hall is also loss-making and needs the leadership and engagement of a

committee to make the necessary changes to keep the hall going.

That's why we recently sent out a survey to find out if this community wants to keep a Village Hall in Froxfield. Sadly only 64 (15%) of the 419 households in the Parish responded and whilst the sentiment was positive in relation to the perceived importance of the hall, this was not matched by enough volunteers to join the committee to run the hall.

A key message was that with the right number of people on an engaged committee and sufficient volunteers to help out with the odd event, volunteering would not be a burden and could even be fun!

General volunteers

On the positive side, we had 26 people say they are willing to create a pool of volunteers that could be called upon to help with any events the committee puts on (typically the Fireworks and 3 pop-up events) and with any other tasks that would help the hall, such as identifying Yoga teachers and letting them know of the venue and the local demand (39 people said they would attend a yoga class at the hall) to see if they would rent the hall and establish a regular class.

The Future of Our Hall continued



Committee Volunteers (Trustees)

Unfortunately, we only had 1 volunteer and 2 "maybe" responses, for committee roles. These roles are for a term of 1 year, as they step down at the AGM, but can stand for reelection. The committee only meets 4 times a year, so it really wouldn't be overly time-

consuming. In the survey, we set out the 8 roles which we think would make the committee function well, by spreading the activities out into manageable roles:

- Chairman
- Treasurer
- Website manager
- Marketing manager
- Bookings manager
- Committee Secretary
- Maintenance manager
- Grants and funding manager

If we can fill these committee roles with engaged volunteer Trustees, we can develop a plan for refurbishing the hall, reducing costs, increasing efficiency, advertising the venue and driving revenues, all to make it a successful hall for the whole community. The next challenge will be to return the hall to making a small surplus, to be able to restore reserves for future capital expenditure. This will be a challenge, but one that can be overcome with the necessary management team in place.

Today is Tuesday and I now have a new regular appointment in my diary for Tuesday afternoons.

My dog Conker and I visit the school and listen to children read! Conker - a rather handsome, black and tan, Cocker Spaniel has become a Therapy Dog and is registered as one of the Pets As Therapy organisation's Therapy Pets.

Therapy Pets are assessed by an independent assessor on behalf of Pets As Therapy (Conker and I met our assessor at the Long Barn in Arelesford, she needed to see how he behaved in a busy, noisy environment) and following a long list of detailed questions, we both passed muster and Conker and I proudly sport our Pets As Therapy identities - for me a badge and he a smart yellow bandana and bright blue embroidered lead whenever he's 'on duty' in Froxfield school.

It's such a pleasure being in the school with Conker - the children are thrilled to see him and call out to him as we pass them in the playground - and he really seems to enjoy quietly 'listening' to the readers we meet. The thinking behind the Read 2 Dogs programme is that the dog's presence encourages an anxious reader to relax and studies have shown that a person's heart rate and blood pressure lowers when they are around dogs and that a dog's presence releases happy hormones in a person, thus reducing the stress levels that trigger anxiety.

As ever it is a privilege to visit the school and be with the children and we both appreciate the warm welcome we receive.

Froxfield School continued

We school governors sometimes get invited to occasions when Froxfield school children are performing in public. Last evening my husband and I were in the audience at the Festival Hall to see the Youth Concert as part of this year's Petersfield Musical Festival. Both Rob and I were very impressed by the glorious singing of the huge children's choir - which is made up of children from eight local schools - and by the amazing playing by so many talented young musicians who made up the Petersfield Area Schools String orchestra, the Combined School's Wind Band and the Combined School's Jazz Band.

It was a real joy to sense the enthusiasm with which all the children in the Combined Schools Choir sang - what a great opportunity it is for those young folk to participate in such a professionally mounted production and to observe and hear such wonderful music played by people only a little older than themselves. I came away feeling so optimistic for the future of the arts - certainly here in Petersfield anyway!

However these events can't take place without the dedication of all the teachers who both teach the singers and the musicians as well as organise everyone to get to rehearsals and the performances.
